ELIGIBILITY: Any neighborhood organizations/associations, CDCs, nonprofits and community leaders or persons with exemplary neighborhood pride - located within the Memphis metropolitan, statistical area.

BUDGET: \$253,000 allocated for program launch - initial round will support three (3) selected projects, with project amounts varying based on factors such as design and location.

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

The UrbanArt Commission (UAC) works to create opportunities for artists and neighborhoods to connect and shape spaces through public art. Since 2002, UAC has managed the City of Memphis's Percent-for-Art program, which allocates funds annually to develop public art in connection to capital improvement projects. UAC also manages grant-funded and privately-funded public art projects. Examples of past and in-progress UAC projects may be viewed at https://uacmem.org/in-progress.

The Neighborhood Art Initiative was initially launched in 2019 with generous support from the Assisi Foundation. UAC believes that creative expression has the power to unlock opportunity and transform communities, and the Neighborhood Art Initiative enables community organizations and leaders to incorporate public art into their ongoing initiatives and neighborhood-level work. The pilot program awarded four public art projects (totaling \$120,000) to Carpenter Art Garden, HUG Park Friends for Gooch Park, South Memphis Alliance and Cherokee Heights Civic Club. UAC is proud to expand the Neighborhood Art Initiative program with \$253,000 allocated to continue this work through the City's percent-for-art program, beginning with three neighborhoods projected to be selected from this initial round of applications. Project budgets will be determined based on the scale of the artwork during the discovery phase of the selected neighborhood projects. In addition to funding the production and installation of the artwork, UAC provides project management support throughout the process (please see Project Expectations below).

PROGRAM MISSION AND VISION:

Neighborhood Art Initiative (NAI) is a collaborative program for neighborhood residents, partners, organizers and artists to shape the creation of public art in their communities and shared spaces, while supporting healthy social connection and overall quality of life throughout the city of Memphis.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES (includes but not limited to):

- Promote equitable distribution of public art projects and resources throughout Memphis neighborhoods
- Encourage inclusivity by starting conversations with residents before art project's site and funding are allocated
- Vitalize new resident networks and strengthen existing relationships in neighborhoods
- Be responsive to a neighborhood's wants, needs, and goals by creating public art that is unique to the characteristics and values of that community
- Expand UAC's ability to support public artists with opportunities to participate in non-arts and culture-specific initiatives
- Align with Memphis 3.0 goals and objectives goals and objectives where appropriate

SCOPE OF WORK

UAC and the NAI selection committee express an interest in applicants whose goals are to enrich public spaces by highlighting neighborhood identity and history while addressing the objectives of the neighborhoods' residents. This application is open to:

- Neighborhood-invested groups/associations, Community Development Corporations (CDCs), non-profits, grassroots constituent-led organizations that are using direct-action, community organizing and base-building strategies to accomplish their goals and arts organizations.
- Neighborhood-led programs/initiatives (community garden, after school program, etc.)
- Individual applicants who have identified project partners at the time of application within the neighborhood.

PROJECT EXPECTATIONS

Neighborhoods will be selected based on the expressed support of their partners and community members, the strength of their application and the potential added value of public art to the identity of the neighborhood. Selected applicants will work closely with UAC to develop these projects and support neighborhood organizing and engagement throughout the public art process.

All NAI projects funded by the City of Memphis must be installed on City-owned property. Applicants may propose a site in their neighborhood or work with UAC to find an appropriate site following the acceptance of their application. The site must be publicly visible and accessible. Applicants may propose a specific artist/s to produce the project or work with UAC to identify artists or facilitate an open call.

The selected community group shall be expected to participate in a committee that will work closely with a selected community organizer as well as a UAC project manager on all phases of the project.

The selected Community Organizer and UAC team will support in the following ways:

- Host public art workshops and meetings for the selected neighborhoods
- Provide guidance to the community group in selecting the artwork, artist, and site
- Organize an artist selection process (announce a competition, manage submissions, etc.) as needed
- Manage the public art project budget as approved by PAOC including costs associated with administrative materials, site preparation, the final artwork, and maintenance

Developing public art is a collaborative process. Upon identifying project funding and/or a site, a selection committee is convened. Each project has its own distinct selection committee, consisting of at least 2 practicing visual artists or arts professionals, 2 neighborhood representatives, an architect or structural engineer, and other key stakeholders as well as a non-voting member, City of Memphis engineer. The selection committee determines a project's 'scope of work', reviews artist submissions, provides feedback to the selected artist and finalists, selects artists for projects, and approves all design, fabrication and installation benchmarks. UAC is a non-voting facilitator on all projects. All decisions made by individual project selection committees on projects funded by the City's percent-for-art program must then be approved by a City-appointed Public Art Oversight Committee (PAOC). The PAOC is a committee of seven members providing general oversight of the Percent-for-Art Program and issues that arise in conjunction with the program.

- 1. Please describe the neighborhood (group/entity) you are applying for a public art project. (Included but not limited to a brief history, geographic boundaries, significant programs/initiatives/neighborhood plans etc.)
- 2. In what way do you see your community being impacted by public art?
- 3. Please describe how you visualize the neighborhood-at-large taking part in this creative process.
- 4. While it is not necessary to have a detailed proposal, if project ideas have been discussed please share those here. For example a mural for an existing community garden; transforming a blighted area into a communal sculpture garden; creative signage recognizing neighborhood identity; etc.
- 5. If selected, you will be asked to help form a project committee. This committee, supported by UAC, will be responsible for approving: artist selection, artwork design changes, fabrication

- milestones and final acceptance of the installed artwork. Who from your neighborhood/organization would serve on the committee for this public art project? (Please list 3-5 names.)
- 6. Are there any other neighborhood entities (businesses, non-profits, artists, schools, faith-based organizations) that would be involved in the project? In what way would they be involved?
